
American Setbacks

The Americans suffered two major setbacks from 1779 to 1781, including:

- The betrayal of American
 General Benedict Arnold (next two slides) against Washington and the Continental Army.
- The British take over the South Georgia by early 1779, and South
 Carolina in May 1780.
 - It happened because Washington directed most of his troops up

Southern resources were more valuable & worth saving.


The British took over the colonies in the South because they thought this would weaken the Continental Army.

Battle for the South

Battle of Cowpens:

- Under the command of Nathanael Greene, the Continental Army scored a victory against the British at Cowpens, South Carolina, on January 17, 1781.
- The Americans killed many British troops, and the battle was a turning point in the war's Southern campaign.






The Last Battle: Battle of

Yorktown

- Can anyone remember who was America's main ally during the revolution?
 - FRANCE
- Washington was promised by Lafayette – the French commander – that a large fleet of French ships would be arriving to Virginia (America had no navy!).
- Washington saw this as his chance to finally take down British General Cornwallis, and possibly end the whole war.



The End: Battle of Yorktown

- After losing at the Battle of Cowpens in South Carolina, Cornwallis and his British troops moved north toward Virginia.
- Unfortunately, Cornwallis had no idea that MOST of Washington's army and the French were already located up there.....
- Cornwallis did not know that by the time he would get up there, his British ships would be trapped and surrounded by the French navy ships.
- Cornwallis was heading into a trap, and he didn't even know it!!!
